As a high school boy, I was fond of quoting Mark Twain, "Never put off until tomorrow what you can do the day after tomorrow." These days though I find safety in the everincreasing number of confessed delayers I discover. Research reveals that about a quarter of us self-identify as chronic procrastinators.

In 1920s Vienna, Russian psychologist Bluma Zeigarnik observed that waiters in a café easily recalled the details of a bill before customers paid, but if questioned about the bill after the customer had paid, they strained to remember anything at all about what had been ordered. Following thorough experiments, she concluded that the completion of a job provides us closure, freeing us from the worry that picks at our nerves while the job remains unfinished. The waiters' trick was to keep "spinning the plates" of the

open orders in their heads whilst letting those which are completed "fall." Once completed an order could be forgotten . . . so why not get it over with? This commonly felt fretfulness to carry a task through to completion is known in the psychology business as the Zeigarnik effect. The best way to get something done is to begin. And this motivational wisdom works not only forgetting out of bed or completing the household chores - in my case as a preacher it works in preparing a sermon.

Putting things off can have harmful effects on communities as well as individuals. Getting started was at the heart of Martin Luther King's nonviolent strategy for changing our nation from the small first step of a bus boycott. "You don't have to see the whole staircase, just take the first step." Reverend King admonished, "How soon "not now" becomes "never." Advancing in the hope that others will follow can be a lonely business, but God knows it is often required of us. As the American psychologist and philosopher William James put

It "Nothing is so fatiguing as the eternal hanging on of an uncompleted task."

For 2025, let us all pray that procrastination not be the thief of our time. Let us seek God's good guidance in granting that each day we act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly in faith.



January Worship Notes A Season of Epiphanies

Originating in the Eastern Church, Epiphany celebrates the manifestation, "showing forth" of God's salvation to the Gentiles. In Matthew's gospel, we learn that early visitors to the Christ child were magi, who probably traveled from Persia (contemporary Iran) to visit Jesus sometime after his first birthday. Later in history, the tradition of the traveling kings merged with the Western celebration of Christmas based on Luke's narrative. Thus, the Twelve Days of Christmas emerged as the season of the Nativity, beginning with Christmas Eve and Jesus' birth, and ending with Epiphany-the showing of God's glory to the world. As Jesus is the "light to the Gentiles," so Epiphany is a celebration rich in symbolism that including light, incense, and gift giving.



As a celebration in the Church, Epiphany is actually older than Christmas! It has been celebrated on January 6th for centuries, but as a concession to our very secular lives, our United Methodist calendars annually shift our observance to the nearest Sunday before that date. Epiphany invites families to participate in rich, imaginative, and playful rituals. The entire Epiphany of the Lord story is found in Matthew 2:1-12. With a little planning, you can incorporate a number of delightful traditions into your Sunday school class and family celebrations (children or childlike adults are essential too).

Here is a wonderful little observance of the season that you could co-opt for your home. I spent Epiphany in a little town in eastern Bavaria in 1992. Though the season was cool, damp, and dim the townspeople made merry parties in their homes. Walking from one gathering to the next, I noticed the lintel above each front door had chalk marks: 19 + C + M + B + 92. In some European homes, it is customary at Epiphany to mark the lintel above doorways with symbols of blessing. You might invite your children (or convince your parents) to mark your own front door with these symbols: the date, the initials of the Magi—Casper, Melchior, and Balthasar (names and number are not found in the bible story, by the way, but come to use through tradition), and four crosses. Order these symbols in the following way, 20 + C + M + B + 25 (current year), with the four crosses representing the four seasons. In the new year, this marking serves as a blessing over the entire household. Be artistic and creative. The marking may be made with chalk or on a piece of cardboard that has been decorated with colored markers and designs.

Your Pastor Went to Hurricane Helene Relief Response Mobilization


In the wake of the devastating impact of Hurricane Helene, an Early Response Team (ERT) from the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference and the Greater New Jersey Conference of the United Methodist Church was mobilized to offer assistance in Northern Georgia. Your pastor was part of the team. The team of 11 volunteers, led by Rev. Cricket Denton, the Disaster Response Coordinator for the Greater New Jersey Conference, arrived ready to provide vital aid and relief to residents grappling with the aftermath of the storm.

Equipped with tools, training, and compassion, the team's primary focus was on debris removal and securing homes damaged by fallen trees, broken fences, and other structural issues left by the hurricane. Their mission is to help stabilize communities so that recovery and rebuilding efforts can proceed more smoothly.

The United Methodist Church's Early Response Teams are trained to respond swiftly in disaster situations, providing help to individuals and communities in crisis. This deployment was yet another example of the church's commitment to serving others in times of need, bringing comfort and tangible support to those affected by natural disasters. Because DHUMC is part of the Conference, we are part of providing this resource.

"Our goal is to be the hands and feet of Christ," Rev. Denton explained. "We're here to help clear the path forward for those whose lives have been disrupted by this storm." The team remained in Northern Georgia for a week, assisting as many households as possible and offering a sense of hope amid the challenges of recovery.

The two conferences will be working together again in January to deploy a second team of Early Responders, which will be led by the Conference Disaster Response Coordinator from EPA, Denise Shelton. For more information on joining the team, please contact Denise at dshelton@epaumc.church.

January 6th to March 4th


